MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON DOMESTIC FUEL TAKEN BY DEPARTMENT OF COAL/MINISTRY OF ENERGY ON 26.11.90 AT BHABHA CHAMBER SCOPE COMPLEX, NEW DELHI.

INAUGURAL SESSION.

Inaugurating the meeting, Shri R. C. Jain, Secretary (Coal) extended a hearty welcome to all present. He observed this was the first meeting after assumption of charge by the new Minister and MOS for Energy. He also pointed out the significance of this meeting at a critical time so far as the energy scenario was concerned in the context of the Gulf crisis and its likely impact on the availability and prices of petroleum products. He explained that the Deptt. of Coal would like to play its part in tiding over the crisis and invited the State Government agencies to extend all support and cooperation in making coal available to the small consumers and the domestic sector.

He observed that coal production had gone up substantially after the nationalisation of the coal industry. The growth during the last few years has been at the rate of 7 to 8% which was comparable to the growth in the industrial sector, but there was still a gap between the demand and availability of coal. The requirement of the domestic sector alone has been placed at a level of 7 to 8 million tonnes per year and together with other small consumers it is of the order of 20-25 million tonnes per year.

Soft coke production had registered a steady fall from 2.2 million tonnes per year in 1980-81 to about 1 million tonnes in 1989-90 which is likely to stagnate at the same level. The reasons for fall in production amongst others were concen-

trated pollution in the areas of production, non availability of railway sidings for burning coal and unremunerative returns to the coal companies. He, therefore, stressed that a new focus was needed with more stress on availability of alternative coal based domestic fuels and supply of energy of small industries where the demand satisfaction was very low. Supplies of coal to these sectors therefore, had to be stepped up. He further stressed that this could be made possible only with much greater involvement of the State Govts. However, he clarified that no decision would be imposed on the states by the Central Government but pleased that rational solution to the problem should be evolved mutually with the help of the Dept. of Coal, Railways and State agencies. He then invited the Minister and MOS for Energy to address the gathering.

The Minister of Energy in his address focussed attention on the special responsibility his Ministry had been called upon to shoulder as a result of the happenings out side the country, which affected us internally. The Minister lauded the efforts made by the Department of Coal in calling the meeting at a very appropriate time with the State authorities for finding a solution to the domestic fuel problem.

The Minister noted that cow dung and fire wood continued to be the major domestic fuel for the rural population. But of late, he opined that the Government was becoming increasingly aware of effects of deforestation and the people were also psychologically turning against the discriminate cutting of trees. Conversion of fire wood to charcoal should therefore be restricted only to most essential usages. He felt that despite best efforts by Govt. Kerosene and LPG may not be available in required quantities in future. Hence the need for looking for alternative domestic fuel concerted efforts were therefore, needed in the adoption of Bio-gas and other scientific methods of production of domestic fuels and also to increase the production of coal based Domestic fuels for augmenting the shortages for meeting the existing demands of house hold and small scale industries.

There was plentiful availability of lignite in the states of Rajasthan and Gujarat and these needed to be converted into domestic fuels of the type of LECO manufactured by Mayveli Lignite Corporation.

The Minister very briefly placed before the meeting the proposals for supply of coal to the small and domestic consumers by starting dumps at Divisional Headquarters under the management of State Govt. from where coal could be supplied to the districts and requested that the meeting may consider the proposal in the overall interest of the consumers.

The Minister of State for Energy then addressed the meeting. Keeping in view the constraints on import of Petroleum base domestic fuels and the need to preserve the environment, he set the following as the basic tasks of the coal industry:

1. Development of our coal reserves.
2. Development of infrastructure to reach coal to the consumers in every corner of the country at reasonable price.

He mentioned that Coal India had taken up some programmes to tide over the crisis. He also touched upon the limited rail capacity for movement of coal as well as the rising freight charges. He also observed that the nation wide drive initiated by Coal India was praiseworthy in popularising coal based domestic fuel and felt that there should be some regular propaganda on domestic fuel through public media to make people conscious. However, he stressed that joint efforts by Coal India, Railways and State Govts. would be necessary to make the whole scheme a success.

Shri S.K. Choudhury, CMD/CCL summing up the inaugural session, thanked the Minister of Energy, the Minister of State for Energy Department of coal for organising the meeting with the state Governments at an appropriate time when the nation is looking forward to a solution to the current energy crisis. He thanked the representatives from state Govts. for responding to the invitation.

He explained that coal delivery posed problem mainly because of the geographical location of the coalfields in relation to the vast expanse of the country and observed that inter-action of the Railways and the state governments under the situation was absolutely essential, particularly when the distribution of domestic fuel was controlled by the State Governments.

He pointed out that while the stress so long had been laid upon meeting the requirements of the large industries, the domestic sector demands did not receive adequate attention. According to him technologies were available and solution should be evolved with the participation of all. He assured that the decisions taken by the Ministry would be implemented and Coal India would continue to give due importance to the needs of the domestic sector.

BUSINESS SESSION

Initiating the discussions, Secretary, Department of Coal requested Shri K.K. Misra, Jt. Secretary (Coal) to briefly explain the current situation and steps proposed for consideration of the State Govts.

Shri K.K. Misra explained the goal of the MISSION outline by the Department of Coal on production and distribution of coal based domestic fuel. The following basis targets have been fixed in the mission : —

1. Setting up of 1000 new SSF and Brequetting plants by September 1990-91.
2. Setting up of 100 new coal dumps. Existing and new dumps to supply coal to SSF and Briquetting Units.

Shri Misra clarified that the mission has been discussed with the Railway who have in principle agreed for a higher priority for movement of coal to these dumps. For coordinating supply of coal to the domestic sector and small consumers the following committees have been proposed by the Department of Coal:—

1. STATE LEVEL COMMITTEES (headed by the Director of Food and Civil Supplies or Director of Industries.)

Members: i) Director of Food & Civil Supplies/Director of Industries.

- ii) Representative of Railways.
- iii) Representatives of Bank/Financial Institutions.
- iv) Representatives of Users.

Load Coal companies will act as the convenor of the above Committee.

2. DUMP LEVEL COMMITTEES (one for each dump)

- Members:
- i) Local Dy. Commissioner/District Collector.
 - ii) RSM, Coal India Ltd.
 - iii) Representative of the consumers.

TECHNOLOGY OPTIONS :—

The SSF and Briquetting technology was advocated by the Department of Coal. Out of the above two options, the SSF Technology required some looking properties in coal and called for comparatively higher level of investment. Joint Secretary requested CMPDIL to waive the project report preparation fee now being charged by CPMDIL for making Project Report for SSF Plants. Regarding the 'Know-how' fee charged by CPMDIL over and above Project Report preparation fees, it was clarified by the Director, Department of Coal, that only 50% of the fee could be waived as the SSF Technology was held under joint patent by CMPDIL with a private agency whose share on the 'know-how' fee is 50% as per the agreement with the private party. About technology for production of domestic fuel from lignite in Gujarat and Rajasthan it was felt that Neyveli lignite Corpn. May be in a position to offer suitable technology. It was also decided to locate other agencies, who could offer suitable technology for processing of Coal/Lignite to domestic fuel.

The Jt. Secretary stated that once the locations of the dumps were identified in consultation with the concerned agencies, linkages to the Projects should offered expeditiously.

Secretary (Coal) then invited the State representatives present to offer their views. The views expressed by various state authorities are minuted below :—

PUNJAB :

Shri T.K.A. Nair, Financial Commissioner (Industries) summed up his views as under :

1. In the past a couple of briquetting units were operating in the state, but these units did not work well which might have been due to technological short-comings or problems of marketing of the product.
- ii. 3 coal dumps have been operating in the state but their performance have not been satisfactory.

- iii. Private entrepreneurs should be first convinced about the techno-economic viability of the domestic fuel project before implementation.
- iv. There should be guarantee of techno-economic viability and availability of plant and equipment.

U.P.

Shri A.V. Singh, Secretary, Small Industries Govt. of U.P. stated as under :-

- i. There were about 260 briquetting Units in the state but their performance have not been upto the mark reportedly for want of coal supplies. The Director of Industries has therefore banned registration of fresh units. However, in the context of the present crisis the state has no objection in issuing fresh registration provided coal supply is ensured.
- ii. Regarding operation of dumps, it was clarified that the state already has 42 dumps, under the UPSIDC and 32 under private enterprised. There should also be no problems in opening additional dumps for the purpose in view.
- iii. UP had two SSF Units already in operation and number of entrepreneurs have shown interest in the project. the state would issue registration once coal availability is assured.

TAMIL NADU :

Shri J.S. Syeim, Director of Industries, Tamil Nadu pointed out the following:

- i. In view of high cost of transportation of coal, it was to be examined if the prices of the domestic fuel would be acceptable to the consumers.
- ii. The present available fuel made from lignite (LECO) was mostly being consumed by the tea gardens and other small industries and only a small portion was used for domestic purposes.
- iii. It was felt that coal supply situation in Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Kerela may remain difficult as SCCL was not in a position to meet the full demand and WCL/SECL have to meet the shortfall. Sericus efforts are therefore, needed to explore the possibility of making domestic fuel from lignite.
- iv. D.I. Tamil Nadu requested for a presentation on domestic fuel by CMPDIL/ CIL at the State Headquarters to which Chief of Marketing, Coal India Ltd. readily agreed.

M.P.

Shri G.K. Shukla, Secretary, Civil Supplies stated that there were a number of briquetting units operating in the state. But the status of these units were to be examined. About SSF they would require more time to study the proposals before MP Government can react. He also stated that whether the coal dumps for the purpose are to managed by State Government, is to be decided. ACMD, CCL stressed upon the possibilities of generating additional employment of unemployed youth with such schemes the MP representative reacted stating that

the techno-economic viability of the Project and modalities of management of such stockyards are to be established before hands. It was also to be examined whether the capacity of the existing units can be enhanced.

MEGHALAYA :

Shri S.K. Agnihotri, Secy. Industries & Food & Civil Supplies reiterated that there was no problem of availability of domestic fuel in the region which comes mostly from cottage mining industries. The quality of coal is also good. However, he expressed concern about the continuity of the present mining practice and coal resources on along term basis besides lack of trained manpower. However, taking futuristic outlook he was in favour of setting up a nucleus for domestic fuel in the state and looked forward to coal India's help for setting up of such facility. He was assured by the Jt. Secretary, Deptt. of Coal and Chief of Marketing Coal India Limited that such he would be extended by CMPDIL, CIL.

KERALA :

Shri J. Padmagirishwaran, CMD, SIDCO clarified that currently there is no SSF or Briquetting Units operating in the State. It would also be difficult to introduce such fuels in view of the area no being a traditional consumer of coal based domestic fuel. Secretary (Coal) wanted to know if there was any crunch on the domestic fuel front in the State. It was decided that the actual domestic fuel position needs to be ascertrained. In this connection the state representative requested for arranging a presentation on Domestic fuels.

ORRISSA :

Shri B.K. Patnaik, CMD, Orissa Small Industries Corpon. pointed that there are about 140 briquetting Units in the state out of which only 60% are working. He further pointed out that most of these units are accustomed to coke breeze briquetting and that oke breeze was also the favoured raw material. Due to shortage in coke breeze availability the Briquetting units are starving and it is to be seen whether these can switch over to either a mixed feed of coal/coke breeze and/or coal alone as raw-material. The state representative also requested for exemption of certain takes to make coal based briquetts acceptable economically.

Regarding operation of dumps they wanted to know the terms and conditions. To this, Chief of Marketing, Coal India Ltd., clarified that CIL have been operating dumps in Orissa and he would arrange a meeting between RSM, Bhubaneshwar has also desinged a chulla which should tested on coal based fuels.

KARNATAKA :

Shri Bulla Subba Roa, Director of Industries, Karnataka, clarified that there is no coal dump or briquetting unit in the State and as such it is not known whether the product would be acceptable. There is no dearth of entrepreneurship in the State provided the techno-economic viability of SSF/Briquetting projects could be established. However, he reitreted that the State had strict

pollution control norms and this should be kept in view. He also requested for a presentation for awareness of the likely entrepreneurs. They would more dumps in the State.

BIHAR :

Shri B. Kapthuana, Secy. Food Supply and Commerce, Govt. of Bihar, appreciated the idea of setting up of more domestic fuel plants particularly in the context of kerosene availability situation and non-availability of allotted quantity of soft coke by the State. He however, emphasised the need for ensuring availability of raw material for such plants.

The issue of restriction on trade licence imposed by Bihar Govt. was also discussed during the deliberations. The State representative was requested to lift the restrictions for ensuring the smooth flow of coal and coal products from the State. In this context Coal India Representatives clarified that in order to meet the shortfall in the soft coke, Coal India can supply steam coal in lieu of soft coke.

HARYANA :

Smt. Asha Sharma, Commissioner Secy. Deptt. of Food and Supplies, stated that Coal briquetting is not economical and out of 26 units in the State, only 6 are working. She stressed on the relative economics of using various domestic fuels like kerosene, LPG and soft coke, Normally, fire wood, dung cake and kerosene oil are the main domestic fuels for rural areas. She requested for presentation by Coal India on domestic fuels to expose the entrepreneurs.

Regarding coal dumps there was already one in existence and three more are required which could be tied up with the new projects. The state, however, would extend all cooperation to such projects subject to techno-economic viability and in conformity with the pollution standards.

MAHARASTRA :

Smt. Mridula Gadgil, Jt. Director of Industries, mentioned that existing coal dumps were not operating satisfactorily. She however, assured that the State would make all out efforts to popularise the new technologies and requested for presentation on domestic fuel by Coal India.

Secy. Deptt. of Coal, pointed out that a proper assesment on demand of coal for both domestic and industrial sectors should be carried out by the State.

TRIPURA :

Shri Ajit Kumar Bhowmic, CMD of Small Industries Corpon., clarified that the State does not have any experience with coal, use of which is confined to tea and brick indusrties. The domestic fuels used are kerosene, LPG and fire wood, the demand on the latter being heavy, the State was fast losing forest cover. There is only one rail head at Dharam Nagar, Only 50% of the existing demand for domestic fuels are being met. They welcomed the suggestion for opening a

dump at Charam Nagar. They also requested that CIL representative should inter-act with State Govt. which was readily agreed to by Chief of Marketing, Coal India Limited.

HIMACHAL PRADESH :

Shri K.K. Khanna, Dy. Director, Food & Supplies, emphasised that there is an acute fuel crisis in the state. Presently against 18 litres of kerosene allotted per ration card only 2/3 are made available. Steam coal is mainly used for room heating and only 50% of the allotted quota is available.

There is no briquetting/SSF units in the State. The State representative requested for atleast 3 coal dumps to cater to the demand. Coal India representative clarified that ROM coal from BCCL or Karanpura field can be supplied Chandigarh rail head where from onward transportation to Himachal Pradesh would be required.

Secy. Deptt. of Coal desired that a status paper should be prepared on the fuel requirement of the State. CIL/CMPDIL can identify and help the State in solving the fuel problems.

WEST BENGAL :

Shri S. Kar, Addl. Director of Industries, pointed out that most of the briquetting units in the State are based on coal fines and some of the briquetting units produce carbonised brequettes. The coal based units are normally supplied with 50% of their requirement.

A number of coal dumps were in operation in the State under the State Industries Corporation, Additional dump facilities are also acceptable.

Regarding SSF units, it was felt by the State representative that modalities of adoption are to be examined.

RAJASTHAN :

The representative of State Civil Supplies Deptt., expressed status willingnes to give trial to SSF/Briquette in view of fuel shortage in the State.

DELHI :

Shri Narendra Prasad, Commissioner, Food & Civil Supplies, stated that LPG/Kerosene and soft coke were the major comestic fuels used. A few briquetting plants were set up earlier but they ran into problems. He preferred inport of the finished product to the Union Territory from the producing centres as there is additional demand of soft coke.

LAKSHA DWEEP :

Shri P.R. Ramasam, Liaison Officer of the Union Territory, expressed that the trend of the people is to use kerosene, coconut husk and shell. LPG has

been introduced recently in Kavaratty islands. The feasibility of new fuels will be studied and a report submitted.

CMPDIL who were requested to offer their technical opinion, stated that :

1. The SSF technology should be based on specific types of coal in view of technological requirements of the process. The SSF process should be looked upon as a mechanised substitute for production of uniform quality of fuel with better recovery and less pollution of the atmosphere.
2. Briquetting technology on the other hand was more flexible with respect to coal quality and was not covered by CMPDIL. Patent, Semi-coking and Non-coking coal can be used for briquetting with suitable binders.
3. However, for good quality of smokeless briquettes, coal with certain definite properties were preferable.
4. Briquettes produced from non-coking coal are liable to produce some smoke in the initial stages which should be acceptable in greater interest.

Secretary, Coal summed up the meeting by indentifying the following immediate action points.

- (i). State Govts./ Union Territories should forthwith constitute the State/High-level Committee (HCC) to implement the mission.
- (ii) Coal companies which will have lead, responsibility in each State/UT. had already been fixed.
- (iii) HLCS would call their meetings at the earliest and identify the locations for coal dumps as also take other necessary steps to implement the mission.
- (iv). Railways shall consider giving higher priority for movement of coal to dumps.
- (v). Coal companies would take immediate steps to supply adequate quantity of coal to existing units.
- (vi) Mission would be monitored by CMPDIL and monthly status report will be prepared by tenth of succeeding month to Deptt. of Coal/Coal India Limited.
- (vii) As an interim measure CIL would maximise supply of soft coke to State Govts.

Secretary Coal thanked the participants. The participants thanked the Secretary for a very useful meeting.
