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## THE NORTH-EASTERN HILL UNIVERSITY ACT, 1973

AN
AOT
to establish and incorporate a teaching and affliating Univarsity for the hill areas of the Nerth-Eastern region.
Whereas it is expedient to establish and incorporate a teaching and affiliating University for the benefit of the people of the hill areas of the North-Fiastern region and to develop the intellectual, academic and cultural background of the said people.
and whereas in pursuance of clause (1) of article 252 of the Constitution, resolution have been passed by the Legislatures of the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland to the effect that the setting up of a Central University for the hill areas of the North-Eastern region shall be regulated by Parliament by law;

Be it enacted by Parliament in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Republic of Indis as follows :-

1. (1) This Act may be called the North Eastern Hill University Act, 1973.
(2) It extends to the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union territories of Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram.

(3) It shall come into force on fuch date as the Central Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint.
2. In this Act, and in all Statutes made hereunder, unless the context otherwise requires,-
(a) "Academic Council" means the Academic Connoil of the University;
(b) "Academic staff" means such categories of staff as are designsted as academic staff by the Ordinances;
(c) "Board of Studies" means the Board of Studies of the University;
(d) "Chancellor", "Vice-Chancellor" and "Pro-Vice-Cbancellor" mean, respectively, the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor avd Pro-ViceCbancellor of the University;
(e) "College" means a College maintained by, or admitted to the privileges of the University;
( $f$ ) "Court" means the Court of the University;
(g) "Department" means a Department of studies, snd includes a Centre of Studies;
( $h$ ) "Employee" mesns any person appointed by the University and includes tosochers and other staff of the University;
(i) "Executive Council" means the Executive Council of the University;
( $j$ ) "Hall" means a unit of residence or of corporate life for the students of the University, College or Institution, provided, maintainedior recognised by the University;
(k) "Institution" means an academic institution not being a College, maintained by, or admitted to the privileges of, the University;
(l) "North-Elastern region'' means the North-Eastern region of India comprising the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union territories of Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram;
( $m$ ) "Principal" means the Head of a College or an Institution and includes where there is no Principal, the person for the time being duly appointed to act as Principal, and, in the absence of the Principal or the acting Priocipal, a Vice-Principal duly appointed as such;
(n) "Recognised teachers" means such persons as are recognised by the University for the purpose of imparting instruction in a College or an Institution admitted to the privileges of the University;
(o) "School", means a School of Studies of the University;
( $p$ ) "Statutes", "Ordidances" and "Regulations", mean, respectively, the Statutes, Ordinances and Regulations of the University for the time being in force;
(q) "Teachers of the University" means Professors, Readers, Lecturers and such other persons as may be appointed for imparting instruction or condncting research in the University or in any College or Institution maintained by the University and are designated as teachers by the Ordinances;
(r) "University" means the North-Eastern Hill Universits.
3. (1) There shall be established a Univeraity by the name of "North Eastern Hill University".
(2) The hesdquarters of the University' shall be at Shillong and it shall have campuses in the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland; it may also establish campuses at such other places within its jurisdiction ás it may deem fit.
(3) The first Cbancellor and the first Fiee-Chancellor and the first members of the Court, the Executive Council and the Academic Council and all persons. who may hereafter becomesuch officers or members, so long as they continue to hold such office or membership, are hereby constituted a body corporate by then name of "North-Eastern Hill University".
(4) The University shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and sball sue and be soed by the stid name. $s$
4. The objects of the University shall be to diseeminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional and researeh facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit; to pay special attention to the improvement of the social and economic conditions and welfare of the people of the hill areas of the North-Eastern region and, in particular, their intellectual, aeademiq, and aultural advaucement.
5. The University shall' have the following powers, namely:-
(1) to provide for instruction in such branches of learning as the Univeraity may, from time to time, determipe and to make provision for research and for the advancement and dissemination of knowledge;
(2) to take such academio steps as would contribute to the improvement of the economic conditions and welfare of the people of the hill sreas of the North-Lastern region;
(3) to grant, subject to such conditions as the University may determine, diplomas or certificates to, and confer degrees and other soademic distinctions on the basis of examinations, evaluation or any other method of testing, on perepns, and to withdraw syy such diplomas, certificates, degrees or other academic distipctions for good and sufficient cause;
(4) to organise and to undertake extra-mural studies and extension services;
(5) to confer honorary degrees or otber distinctions in the manner ppesoribed by the Statutes;
(6, to provide instruction, including correspondence and such other courses, to such persons as are not members of the University, as it may determine;
(7) to institnte principalships, professorships, readerships, lecturerships, and other teaching or academic posts required by the University and to appoint persons to such principalships, professorstips, readerships, leoturerships or other posts;
(8) to recognise parsons for imparting instruction in any College or Ifftitution admitted to the previleges of the University;
(9) to appoint persons workjng in any other University or organisation as teachers of the University for a specified Period;
(10) to create administrative, ministerial and other posts and to make sppointments thereto;

(11) to co-operate or collaborate with any other University or authority in such manner and for such purposes as the University may determine;
(12) to eatablish such campuses, centres, specialised laboratories or other units for research and instruction as are, in the opinion of the University, necessary for the furtherance of its objects;
(13) to institute and award fellowships. scbolarships; studentships, medals and prizes;
(14) to establish and maintain Collages, Institutions and Balls,
(15) to admit to its previleges Colleges and Institutions not maintained by the University; to withdraw all or any of those privileges in accordance with such conditions as may be prescribed by the Statutes; and to recognise Halls not maintained by the University and to withdraw any such recognition;
(16) to declare a College, an Institution or a Department as an autonomous College or an Institution or a Department, as the case may be;
(17) to determine standards for admission into the University, which man include examination, evaluation or any other method. of testing;
(18) to demand and receive payment of fees and other charges;
(19) to supervise the residences of the students of the University and to make arrangements for promoting their healtin and general of welfare;
(20) to make special arrangements in respect of women students as the University may consider desirable;
(21) to regulate and enforce discipline among the employees and students of the University and take such disciplinery measures in this regard as may be deemed necessary;
(22) to make arrangements for promoting the health and general welfare of the employees;
(23) to acquire, hold, mansge and dispose of property, movable or immovable, including trust and ondowment properties for the purposes of the University;
(24) to borrow, with the approval of the Central Government, on the security of the property of the University, money for the purposes of the University;
(25) to do all such other acts and thinge as may be necessary, incidental or conducive to the attainment of all or any of its objects.

Jurisdic. tion.

6 (1) The jurisdiction of the University shall extend to the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Uolon territories of Aruoachal Pradesh ind Mizoram.
(2) No College or Institution situated within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the University shall be compulsorily affliated to the University, and affiliation shall be granted by the Tniversity only to such

Colleges or Institutions as may egree to accept the Statues and Ordinances.
(3) Any College or Institution admitted to the privileges of the University shall cease to be associated with, or be admitted to the privileges of, any other University.
(4) No Collega or Institution situsted within the looal limits of the jurisdiction of the University, but not admitted to its privileges shsil be assooiated with, or be edmitted to the privileges of, any other Univeraity except with the previous approval of the Government of the State in whioh, or the Administrator of the Uaion territory in which, such College or Institution is situated.
7. The University shall be open to persers of either sez and of whatever race, creed, caste, or clast, and it shall not be lawful for the University to adopt or impose on any person any test whatsover of religious belief or profession in order to entitle him to be admitted therein, as a teacher or student, or to hold any office therein, or to graduate thereat;

Provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to pererent the University from mating special provisions for amission of students of the wesker sections of the people in the zorth-Eastern region and, in partioular, of the Soheduled Castes and the Seheduled Tribes.
8. (1) The President of Inddis shall be the 7 fisitor of the University,
(2) The Visitor shall have the right to cause an inspection to be made by such person or persons as be may direot, of the University, its buildings, laboratories and equipment, and of any College or lastitution maintained by the University or sdmitted to its privileges; and also of the examinations, teaching and other work conducted or done by the University and to canes datingiry to be insde in like manner in respect of any matter conmected with the administration or finanoes of the University. Colleges or Institutions
3) The Vistor shall, in every case, give notice of bis intention to cause an inspection or inquiry to be made,-
(a) to the University, if such inspection or inquiry is to be made in respect of the University, College or Institution maintained by it, or
(b) to the management of the College on In ititution, if the inspection or inquiry is to be made in reapect of college or an Institution admitted to the privilege of the University, and the University or the management, as the case inay be, shall have the right to make auch rapresentations to the Visitor, as it may consider necessary.
(4) Atter considering the repesentations, if snyy made by the University or the management, sa the case may be, the Visitor may cause to be made ench inspection or inquiry as is referred to in sub-section (2).
(5) Where any inspection or inquiry has been csused to be made by the Visitor, the University or the management, as the case may be. shall be entitled to appoint a representativeiwho shall have the right to be present and be hard at such inspection or irquiry.
(6) The Visitor may, if the inspection or inquiry is made in respect of the University or any College or Institution maintained by it, address the Vice-Chancellor with reference to the result of such inspection or inquiry, and the Vice-Ohsfeelieryhall:oommunicake to the Rxectative Council the views of the Visitor with such advice as the Visitor may be pleased to offer upamithe action to be taken therson.

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(7) The Visitor may, if the inspection or inquiry is made in respect of any College or institution admitted to the privileges of the University, address the management concerned through the Vice-Chancellor with reference to the result of such inspection or inquiry, his views thereon and such advioe as he may be pleased to offer upon the action to be taken thereon.
(8) The Executive Council or the management, as the case may be, shall communicate through the Vice-Chnncellor to the Visitor such action, if any, as it is proposed to take or bas been taken upon the result of such inspection or inquiry.
(9) Where the Exeoutive Council or the management does not, within a reasonable time, take action to the satisfaction of the Visitor, the Visitor may, after considering any explanation furnished or representation made by the Executive Council or management, issue such directions $\mathrm{as}_{\mathrm{s}}$ he may think fit and the Executive Council or management, as the case may be, shall comply with such direction.
(10) Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions of this section, the Visitor may, by order in writing, mnnual any proceeding of the University which is not in conformity with this Act, the Statutes or Ordinances;

Provided that before making any such order, he shall call upon the University to show oause why such an order should not be made, and, if any cause is shown within a reasonable time, he shall consider the same.
(11) The Visitor sball have such other powers as may be prescribed by the itatutes.
9. The Governor of the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland
Rector shall be the Ghief Rector of the University.

10. The following shall be the officers of the University:-
(1) The Chancellor;
(2) The Vice-Chancellor;
(3) The Pro-Vice-Chancellors;
(4) The Deans of Schools;
(5) The Registrar;
(6) The Finance Officer; and
(7) Such other offlicers as may be declared by the Statutes to be officers of the University.
11. (1) The Chancellor shall be appinted by the the Visitor in such manner as may be prescribed by the statutes.
(2) The Chancellor shail, by virtue of his office, be the Head of the University.
(3) The Chancellor shall, if presnt, preside at the convocations of the University held for conferring degrees.

12 (1) The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Visitor in such manner may be prescribed by the statutes.
(2) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the principal executive and academic officer of the Univeraity, and ahall exercise general supervision and control over she affairs of the Universify and give effect to the deciations of all the authorities of the University.
(3) The Vice-Chancellor may, if he is of opinion that immediate action is necessary on any matter, exercise any power conferred on any authority of the University by or under thisis Act and shall report to such authority the setion taken by him on such matter:

Provided that if the authority concerned is of oplition that such action ought not to have been taken, it may refer the matter to Vigitor whose decision thereon shall be final.

Provided further that any person in the service of the University who is agarieved by the aotion taken by tbe Viee-Chancellor ander this sub-section shall have the right to appeal against such action to the Executive Council within three months from the date on which decision on suct action is communicated to him and therenpon the Execative Counoil may confirm, modify or reverse the action taken by the Vice-Chancellor.
(4) The Vice-Chanoellor sball exercise such other powera and perform such other functions as may be preseribed by the Statutes Ordinances.
13. Uvery Pro-Vice-Cbanoeltor shall be appointed in such manner and shall exergise such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
14. Every Dean of a School shafl be appointed in saeh manner and shall-exeroise such powers and perform such duties as masy be preseribed by the Statutes.
if. (1) The Registrar shall be appointed in suok manner as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
(2) The Registrar shall have the power to enter into agieements, sign doouments and suthenticate records on bebalf of the University and shall exercise such other powers and pefform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Statates.
16. The Finanice Officer shall be appointed in mach manner and shall dxercies such powers and perform such dúties as may bs prescribed by the statuten.
17. The manner of appointment and powers and duties of other officers of the University shall be preseribed by the Statutes
18. The following shall be the aathorities of the University :-
(i) The Oourt;
(2) The Fixeoutive Council;
(3) The academic Counoil;
(4) The Boards of Bohoofs; and
(f) \&uch other authorities is may deelared by the Statutes to be authorities of the University.
19. (1) The constitution of the Ootrt and the term of bfice of ite members shall be preseribed by the - ftatutes:

(2) Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Court shall have the following powers and functions, namely :-
(a) to review, from time to time, the broad policies and programmes of the University and to suggest measures for the improvement and development of the University;
(b) to consider and pass resolutions on the annual report and the annual accounts of the University and the audit report on such accounts;
(c) to advise the Visitor in respect of any matter which may be referred to it for advice; and
(d) to perform such other functions as may be prescribed by the Statutes. .

## Planning

 Bosrd.20. (1) Tbe Executive Council shall be the principal executive body of the University.
(2) The constitution of the Executive Council, the term of office of its members and its powers and duties shall be prescribed by the Statutes
21. (1) The Academic Council shall be the principal academic body of the University and shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes and Ordinances, co-ordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University.
(2) The constitution of the Aoademic Council the term of office of its members and its powers and duties shall be prescribed by the Statutes.
22. The constitution, powers and functions of the Boards of Schools and of such other authorities as may be declared by the Statutes to be authorities of the University, shall be prescribed by the Statutes.
23. (1) There shall be constituted a Planning Eoard of the University which shall advise generally on the planning and development of the University and keep under review the standard of education and research in the University.
(2) The Planning Board shall consist of-
(a) the Vice-Chancellor, who shall be the Chairman, and
(b) not more than eight persons of high academic standing who shall be appointed in sach manver as may be presoribed by the Statutes.
(3) The Visitor may determine a date with effect from whioh the Planning Board shall stand dissolved.
24. Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes may' provide for all or any of the following matters, namely :-
(a) the constitution, powers and functions of the authoritios and other bodies of the University, as may be constituted from time to time;
(b) the election tha 'cen tianembe in vinble of the tinembers' of

(c) the appointment, powers and dpties of the offcers of the Uaiversity and their emoluments;

25. (1) Thie first Stetutels ate those inet out in ther Sohedale.
(2) The Exeoutive Conncil may, from time to time, nake new or sdatiogal Atatubes or may mend or repsal the Statutes referred to in sub-section (1) :

Protided that the Executive Council thell not make amond or repeal, any Statute affecting' the stasus, 'fowefs oryontiftition of

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any authority of the University until sueh authority has been given an opportunity of expressing an opibion in writing on the proposed changes and any opinion so expressed shall be considered by the Exeoutive Councii.
(3) Every new Statute or addition to the Statutes or any amendment or repeal of a Statute shall require the approval of the Visitor who may assent thereto or withhold assent or remit to the Executive Council for consideration.
(4) A new Statute or a statate amending or repesling an existing Statute shall have no validity unless it has been assented to by the Vieitor.
(5) Nowithstantding anytbing contained in the foregoing aubsections, the Visitor may make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the Statutes referred to in sub-section (1) during the period of three years irmmediately after the commencement of this Act:

Provided that the Visitor may, on the expiry of the said period of three years make, within one year from the date of such expiry such detailed Statutes as he may consider necessary and such detsiled Statutes shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament.
26. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Act and the Statutes, the Ordinances may provide for all or any of the following matters, namely:-
(a) the admission of students to the Universily and their enrolment as euch;
(b) the courses of study to be laid down for all degrees, diplomas and certificates of the University;
(c) the medium of instruction and examination;
(d) the award of degrees, diplomae, certificates and otber acsdemic distinctions, the qualifications for the same and the means to be taken relating to the granting and obtaising of the same;
(e) the fees to be charged for conrses of study in the University and for admiasion to the examinations degrees and diplomas of the University ;
(f) the conditions of award of fellowships, scholarships. studentships, medals and prizes;
(g) the conduct of examinations, including the term of office and of appointment and the duties of examining bodies, examiners and moderators;
(b) the conditions of residence of the students of the Oniversity;
(i) the special arrangements, if any, which may be made for the residence, discipline and teaching of women students and the prescribing of special courses of studies for them;
(j) the appointment and erooluments of employees other then those for whom provision has been made in the Statutes;
(k) the establishment of Centres of Studies Boards of Studies, Special Centres, specislised laboratories and other Committees;
(l) the manner of co-operation and, colleboration with other Universities and authorities inoluding learned bodies or associations;
(m) the oreation, composition and funations of ony other body whioh is considered necessary for improving the acodemie life of the University;
( $n$ ) such other terms and conditions of service of teachers and other academic staff as are not preseribed by the Statutes ;
(o) the management of Colleges and Institutions established by the University;
(p) the supervision and management of Colleges and Institutions admitted to the privileges of the University ; and
( $q$ ) all other matters which by this Act or the statatemmy be provided for by the Ordinances.
(2) The first Ordinances ahall be made by the Viee-Cbaneellor with the previous approval of the Central Government ard the Ordinances so made may be amended, repealed br added to at any time by the Executive Council in the manner prescribed, by the Statutes.
27. The authorities of the University may make Regulations consistent with this Act, the Statutes and the Ordinances for the conduct of their own business and that of the Committees appointed by them and not provided for by this Act, the Statutes or the Ordinances in the manner prescribed by the Statates.
28. (1) The annual report of the Univeraity shall be, prepared under the direction of the Executive Council and shall be submitted to the Court on or after such date as may be preseribed by the Statutes and the Court shall consider the report in its annual meeting.
(2) The Court shall submit the annusl report to the Fisitor along with its comments, if any.
29. (1) The annual accounte and balance-sheet of the University shall be prepared ander the directions of the Fixecutive Coancil and ahall once at least every year and at intervals of not more than fifteen months be audited by the Comptroller and Anditor-General of India.
(2) The annual accounts when audited shall be published in the Gazette of India and a copy of the accounts together with the report of the Comptroller and Auditor-General shall be submitted to the Conrt and the Visitor along with the observations of the Executive Council.
(3) Any observations made by the Visitor on the annual accounts shall be brought to the notice of the Court and the observations of the Court, if any, shall, after being considered by the Executive Council, be submitted to the Visitor.
30. (1) Every employee shall be appointed under a written contraet which apall be lodged with the Oniversity end a copy of which shall be furnished to the emptity co concerned.
(2) Any dispute arising out of a contract between the University and any employee shall, at the request of the employee, be wreferred to a Tribinal of Arbitration consisting of ono monber appointed by the Exeoutive Counoil, one member nominated by the

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employee concorned and an umpire appointed by the Visitor. The decision of the Tribuaal shall be final, and no suit shall lie in any civil court in respect of the matters decided by the Tribunal. Every such request sball be desmed to be asubmission to arbitration upon the terms of this section within the mearing of the Arbitration Act, 1940.
31. (1) Any student or candidate for an examination whose name has been ramoved from the rolls of the University by the orders or resolution of the VicerOhancellor, Discipline Committpe or Examination Committee, as the case may be, opd who hes been debarred from apparing at the examinations of the University for more than one year, may, within ten days of the date of receipt of such orders or capy of such resolution by him, appeal to the Exeeutive Council and the Executive Council may confirm, modify'or reverse the decision of the Vice-Chancellor or the Committee, as the eme may be.
(2) Any dispute arising out of any disciplinary action taken by the University against a student shall, at the request of such student be referred to a rTibunal of Arbitration and the provisions of subsection (2) of section 30 shall, as far as may be, apply to a reference made under this sub-section.

32 Every employee or student of the University or of a College or Institution shall, notwithstanding anything contained in this Act, have a right to appeal, within such time as may be prescribed by the Statutes, to the Executive Council against the decision of any officer or authority of the University or of the Principal or the mansgement of any College or Institution, as the case may be and thereupon the Exeoutive Council may confirm, roodify or reverse the decision appealed against.
33. (1) The University shall constitute for the benefit of its employees such pension or provident fund or provide such insurance sohemes as it may deem fit in such manner and subject to sach conditions as may be prescribed by the Statutes,
(2) Where anch provideat or pension fund has been so constituted, the Central Government may declare that the provisions of the Provident Funds Act, 1925, shall apply to such fund, as if it were a Government provident fund.
34. If any question arises as to whether any person has been duly elected or appointed as, or is entitled to be, a member of any authority or other body of the University, the matter shall be referred to the Visitor whose decision thereon shall be inal.
35. Where any authority of the University is given power by this Act or the Statutes to appoint Committees; such Committees shall, save as otherwise provided, consist of the members of the authority concerned and of such other persons (if azyy) as the outhority in each case may think fit.
86. All casual vaconeies mong the mesheris (ofter than
 University shall be filled, as soon as oanvenienty may bey by the person or body who appointed, elected or oo-ppted the member whose place has became vacant and the peraon alpointid, elected or co-opted to a casual vacancy shall be a member of ancis authority or body for the residue of the term thr witionfule person whose place he fills would have been a member.
37. No act or proceedings of any authority or other body of the University' shall be invalidated meroly by remön of the existence of a vacancy or vacancies among its mamberfo.

38. No suit or other legal proceodings find lie against any officer or employee of the University for apything which is in good faitb done or intended to be done is pursuance of any of the provigions of this Act, the Statutes or Ordinances.
39. A copy of any rescipt, application, notice, order, proceeding, resolution of any authority or Committee of the University, or other documents in possession of the University or any entry in any register duly maintained by the Upiversity, if certified by the Bigistrar, shall be received as prima facie evidence of such receipt application, notice, order. proceeding or resolntion; documents or the existence of entry in the register and shall be admitted as evideque of the matters and transactions therein where the original thereol would, if produced, have been admiesible in evidence, notwithstanding anything contained in the Indian Evidence. 1. (1) The Vice-Chancellor shall be a whole-time salaried officer of the University.
(2) The Vice-Chancellor shall hold office for a tarm of five years from the date on which he onters apon his effice and shall be eligible for reappointment for not more than another term;

Provided that lotwithstanding the expiry of the said period of five years, he shall continue in office until his successor is appointed and enters upon his office :

Provided farther that the Visitor may direct that a ViceChancellor, whose term of office has expired, shall continue in office for sudh period, not exceeding a total period of one year, as ming be specified in the direction.
(3) Notwithstanding anything contained in clause (2), a person appointed as Vioe-Chancellor shall, if he completes the age of sixty five years during the term of his office or any extension thereof retire from office.
(4) The emoluments and other terms and onditions of service of the Vice-Chancellor shall be as follows :-
(i) : There etiall be paid to the Vice-Cbancellor a salary of two thousand and five handred rupees per mensem and he shall be ontitled, withont payment of rent, to use a furnished residence throughout his term of office and no charge shail fall on the ViceCharicalior persohally in respect of the maintenance of such residerce.
(ii) The Vree-Chancellor shall not be entiled to the benefts of the University Provident Fund :

Provided that where an employee of -
(a) the University or Colkege or Institation maintained by, or affliated to, it; or
(b) any other University or College or Institution maintained by, or affilisted to, that University, is appointed as Vice-Chavcellor, he shall be allowed to continue to contribute to the provident fund to which he is a subscriber, and the contribution of the University shall be limited to what he bad been contributing immediately before his appointment as Vice-Chancellor.
(iii) The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to travelling allowances at puch rates as any be fixed by the Executive Council.
(iv) The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to leave on full pay for one-eleventh of the period spent by him on active service.
(v) The Vice-Cbancellor shall also be entitled, on medical grounds or otherwise, to leave without pay for a period not exceeding three months during the term of his office ;

Provided that such leave may be converted into leave on full pay to the extent to which he is entitled to leave under sub-clause ( $2 v$ ).
(5) If the office of the Vice-Chancellor becomes vacant due to death, resignation or otherwise or if he is unable to perform his duties owing to absence, illness or any other cause, the Pro-ViceChancellor or if there is more than one Pro-Vice-Cbancellor, the senior-most Pro-Vice-Chancelior, shall perform the duties of the Vice-Chancellor until a new Vice-Chancellor assumes office or antil the existing Vice-Chancellor attends to the duties of bis office, as the case may be;

Provided that if a Pro-Vice-Chancellor is not available, the senior-most Professor sball perform the duties of the ViceChantellor.
2. (I) The Vice-Chancellor shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Court, the Executive Council, the Academic Council and the Finance Committee, and shall, in the absence of the Chancellor, preside at the Convocations of the University held for conferring degrees. The Vice-Chanceilor shall be entitled to be present at, and to address, any meetting of any authority or other body of the University, but shall not be entitled to vote thereat unless ho is a member of such authority or body.
(2) It shall be the duty of the Vice-Chancellor to see that this Act, these Statutes, the Ordinances and the Regulations are duly observed, and he shall have all powers necessary to ensure such observance.

Provided further that a Registrar shall, notwithstanding his attaining the age of sixty years, continue in office until his successor is appointed and enters upon his office or until the expiry of a period of one year whichever is earlier.
(3) When the office of the Registrar is vacant of when the Registrar is, by reason of illness, absence or any other cause. unable to perform the duties of his office the datica of the office shall be performed by such person as the Vice-Chancellor may appoint for the purpose.
(4) (a) The Registrar shall have power to tate disciplinary action against such of the employess, excluding fachers and academic staff, as may be specified in the orders of the Executive Council and to suspend them pending inquiry, administer warnings to them or to impose on them the penalty of censure or the withholding of increment:

Provided that no such penalty shall be imposed uatess the person concerned has been given a reasonable opportunity of showing cause against the action proposed to be taken in regari to him.
(b) An appeal shall he to the Vice-Chancellor against any order of the Registrar imposing any of the penalties specified in subclause ( $a$ ).
(c) In a cose where ibe inquiry discloses that punishoment beyond the powers of the Registrar is called for, the Register, shall, upon conclusion of the inquiry, make a report to the Vice-Chancellor along with his recommendations:

(6) It shall be the daty of the Registrar,-
(a) to be the custodian of the records, the common seal and such
other property of the University as the Executive Cotuncil shall commit to his charge ;
(b) to issue all notiees convening meetings of the Court; the Executive Council, the Academic Couvcil, the Boards of Schools, the Boarde of Studies, the Boards of Examiners and of any committees appointed by the authorities of the University ;
(c) to keep the minntes of all the meetings of the Court, the Executive Council, the Academic Council, the Boards of Schocls and of any Committees appointed by the authorities of the University;
(d) to conduct the official correspondence of the Court, the Executive Council and the Academic Council ;
(e) to arrange for and suptrintend the examinations of the University in accordance with the manner prescribed by the Ordinadees;
(f) to supply to the Visitor, copies of the agenda of the meeting of the authorities of the Uuiversity as soon as they are issued and the minutes of such meetings ;
(g) to represent the University in suits or proceedines by or agsinst the University, sign powers of astorney and verity pleadings or depute his representative for the purpose; and
( $h$ ) to perform such other duties as may be specified in these Statutes, the Ordinances or the Regulations or as may be required, from time to time, by the Executive Council or the Vice-Cbancellor.
5. (1) The Finance Officer sball be a whole-time solaried Ufficer of the University
(2) The emoluments and other terms, and conditions of service of the Finance Officer shall be such as may be prescribed by the Oldinances:

Provided that a Finance Officer shall retire on attaining the age of sixty years :

Provided further that the Finance Officer shall, notwithstavding his attaining the age of sixty years, continue in office until his succeseor is appointed and enters upon his office or until the expiry of a period of one year whichever is earlier.
(3) When the office of the Finance Officer is vacant or when the Finance Officer is, by reason of illness, absence or any other cause unable to perform the duties of bis office, the duties of the office shall be performed by such person as the Vice. Chancellor may appoint for the purpose.
(4) The Finance Officer shall be ex:officio Secretary of the Finance Committee, but shall not be deemed to be a member of such Committee.
(5) The Finance Officer sball-
(a) exeroise general supervision over the funds of the University and shall advise it as regards its financial policy; and
(b) perform such otber financial functions as may be assigned to him by the Executive Council or as may be prescribed by these Statutes or the Ordinances:

Provided that the Finance Officer shall not ineur any expeno diture or make any inveetment exceeding ten thousand rupees without the previous approval of the Fxecutive Council.
(6) Subject to the control of the Executive Council, the Finance Ufficer shall-
(a) hold and manage the property and investments of the University including trust and endowed property ;
(b) ensure that the limits fixed by the Erecutive Oouncil for recurring and nonwreurring expediture for s year are not exceeded and that all moneys are expended on the purposes for which they are granted or allotted ;
(c) be responsible for the preparation of annual accounts and the budget of the University and for their presentalion to the Executive Council;
(d) keep a constant watch on the state of the cash and bank balances and on the state of investments.
(e) watch the progress of the collection of reverus and advise on the methods of collection employed;
(f) ensure that the registers of buildinge, lana, firmiture and equipment are maintained up-to-date and that stcck-checking is conducted, of equipment and other consumable nateriale in all offices, Special Centres; specialised laboratorieb, Coices and Institutions maintsined by the University ;
(g) call for explanation for unauthorised experditure and for otber financial irregularities and suggest disciplinary action against persone st fault; and
(h) eall for from any office, Centre, laboratory, Coliege or Institution maintained by the University any information or returas that he may consider necessary for the performance of his duties.
(7) The receipt of the Finance Officer or of the person or persons duly anthorised in this behalf by the Executive Council for any money payable to the University shall be suffieient disoharge for payment of such money.
6. (1) Every Dean of a School of studies shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor from among the Professors in the School for a period of three years and he sball be eligible for re-appointment:

Provided thata Deen on attaining the age of sixiy years shall cease to hold office as such :

Provided further that if at any time there is no Irofessor in a School, the Vice-Chancellor, or a Pro-Vice-Chancellor. if autborised by the Vice-Chancellor in this behalf, shall exercise the powers of the Dean of the School ;

(3) A person appointed as the Head of the Department sball hold ofice as such for a period of three years and shall be eligible for re-appointment.

(5) A Head of a Department shall perform such functions as may be prescribed by the Ordinances,
8. (1) Every Dean of Students, welfare shall be appointed from amongst the teachers of the University not below the rank of a Reader, by the Executive Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.
(2) Every vean appointed under clause (1) shall be a whole time officor and shall hold office for a term of three years and shall be eligible for re-appointment.

Provided that the Executive Council may, if it is considered neceasary, appoint, on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellur a teacher, not below the rank of a Reader, to discharge the duties of the Dean of Students' Welfare in addition to bis duties as such teacher, and in such a case, the Executive Council may sanction a suitable allowance to be paid to bim.

(5) The duties and powers of a Dean of Students' Welfare shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.
9. (I) Every Prootor shall be appointed by the Executive Council on the regommendation of the Vice-Chancellor and shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be assigned to him by the Vice-Chancellor.
(2) Every Proctor shall bold office for a term of two years and shall be eligible for re-appointment.
10. (1) Every Librarian shall be appointed by the Executive Council on the recommendation of the Selection Committee constituted for the purpose and he shall be a whole-time officer of the University.
(8) Every Librarian shall exercise such powers and perfoam suoh daties as may be assigoed to him by the Exeoutive Conncil.
11. (l) An annual meeting of the Court shall be held on a date to be fixed by the Brecative Council unless some other has bose fixed by the Court in respoct of any year.

(2) At an annal meeting of the Court, a report on the working of the Univeraity during the previous year, together with s statement of the receipts and expenditure, the balance-sheet, as audited and the financial estimates for the next year shall li: presented.
(3) A copy of the statement of receipts and expenditure, the balance-sheet and the financial estimates refer red to in clause (2) sball be sent to every member of the Court at least seven days before the date of the annual meeting.
(4) Twelve members of the Court sball form a quorum for a meeting of the Court.
(5) Special meetings of the Court may be convened by the Executive Council or the Vice-Cbancellor, or if therg is nu ViceChancellor, by a Pro-Vice-Chancellor, or if there is ne Pro-ViceChancellor, by the Kegistrar.

Powers and functions of Executiva Council.
12. Five members of the Executive Council shall form a guorum for a meeting of the Fxecutive Council.
13. (1) The Executive Council shall have the maragement and administration of the revenue and property of the University and the conduct of all administrative affairs of the Thiverety not otherwise provided for
(2) Subject to the provisions of this Act, these Statutes and the Ordinances, the Executive Council shall, in adidion to sll other powers vested in it, have the following powers, namely :-
(i) to create teaching and academic posts, to determine the number and emoluments of such posts and to define the duties and conditions of service of Professors, Readers, Lecturers, and otlier academic staff and Principals of Colleges and Institations mainthined by the University.

Provided that no action sball be taken by the Exfentive Council in respect of the number, qualificitions and the emoluments of teachers and aeademic staff otherwise than after consideation of the recommendations of the Academic Council;
(i.i) to appoint such Professors Readera, Lecturers and other academic staff, as may be necessary, and Principals of Colleges and Institution mainlained by the University on the jecommendation of the Selection Committee constituted for the purpose and to fill up temporary vacancies therain ;
(isi) to create administrative, ministerial and oticc necessary posts and to make appointments thereto in the manner prescribed by the Ordinances ;
(iv) to grant leave of absence to any officer of the University, other thau the Cbancellor and the Vice-Chancellor, and to make necessary arrangements for the discharge of the functione of such officer during his absence;
(v) to regulate and enforce disoipline among employees in accordance with these Statutes and the Ordinances ;
(vi) to manage and regulate the finances, accounts, investmente, property, business and all other administrative affairs of the University, and for that parpose, to appoint such agents as it may think fit;
(vii) to fix limits on the total recurring and the total nonrecurring expenditure for a year on the recommendations of the Finance Committee;
(viii) to invest any money belonging to the University, includitg any unapplied income, in such stocks, fasing shares or securities as it shall, from time to time, think fit, or in the parchase of immovable property in India, with the like powers of varying such investments from time to time;
(ix) to transfer or accept transfers of any movable or immovable property on behalf of the University ;
$(x)$ to provide buildings, premises, furniture and appa ratue and other means needed for carrying on the work of the University;
( $x$ i) to enter into, very, carry out and cancel contracte on behalf of tbe University;
(xii) to entertain, adjudicate upon, and, if thought fit, to redress any grievances of the employees and students of the University, who may, for any reason feel aggrieved;
(xiii) to appoint examiners and moderators and, if necessary to remove them, ard to fix their fees, emoloments and travelling and other allowanees, after consulting the Academic Council ;
(xiv) to select a common seal for the University and provide for the custody and use of such seal;
( $x v$ ) to make such special arrangements as may be necensary for the residence and discipline of women students;
(xvi) to delegate any of its powers to the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellors, the Registrar or the Finance Officer or such other employee or authority of the University or to a Committee appointed by it as it may deem fit;
(xvii) to institute fellowships, scholarship, studentship, medals and prizes ; and
(xviii) to exercise such other powers and perform auch other duties as may be conferred or imposed on it by this Act, or these Statutes.
14. Nine members of the Aoademic Counoil shall form a quorum for a meating of the Academic Council.

[^0]15. Subject to this Act, these Statates and the Ordinances, the Academic Gouncil shall, in addition to all other powers vested in it, have the following powers, namely :-
(a) to exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University and to give directions regarding methods of
instruction, co-operotive teaching among Colleges ar: 1 Inctitutions, evaluation of research or improvements in academic standards;
(b) to bring about inter-School co-ordination, establish or appoint Committees or Boards, for taking up projects on an interSchool basis;
(c) to cunsider matters of general academic inesest either oni its own initiative or on a reference by a School or sic: Executive Council and to take appropriate action thereon; ane
(d) to frame such regulations and rules consistert with these Statutes and the Ordinances regarding the academic functioning of the Univertsity, discipline, residences, admiseions, award of fellowships and studedtships, fee concessions, corparite life and attendance.

Schools of Studiea asd Depnrtmenta:
16. (1) The members of the Planning Board shall be appointed by the Visitor and sball hold office for such periou as he may determine.
(2) Tbe Planning Board shall, in addition to all other powers vested in it by this Act, bave the right to advise the Executive Council and the Academic Council on any academic matter.
(3) On the date determined by the Visitor under sub-section (3) of section 23, this Statute shall cease to have effect.
17. (1) The University shall bave such Scbools of Studies as may be specified by the Ordinances.
(2) Every Sohool shall have a . School Board. The members of the first School Board shall be nominated by the Executive Council and shall bold office for a period of three years.
(3) The prowers and function of a School Board shall be prescribed by the Ordinences.
(4) The conduct of the meetings of a School Board and the quorum required for such meetings shall be prescribed by the Ordinances,
(5) (a) Each School shall consist of such Departments as may be assigned to it by the Ordinances.
(b) No Department shall be established or abohished except these Statutes:

Provided that Executive Council may, on the rocommendation of the Academic Council, establish Centres of Studies to which may be assigned such teachers of the University as the Executive Council may consider necessary.
(c) Each Department shall consist of the following members, namely:-
(i) teachers of the Department;
(ii) persons conducting research in the Department;
(iii) Dean of the School or Deans of the Bohools concerned; (iv) honorary Professors, if any, attached to the Department ; and
(v) such other persons as may be wembers of the Department in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinances.
18. (1) Each Department shall have two Boards of Studies, one for Post-graduate Studies and the other for Under-graduste Studifs.
(2) The constitution of a Board of Post-gradnate Studies and the term of office of its members shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.
(3) The functions of a Board of Post-graduate Studies shall beto approve subjects for research for various degrees and other requirements of research degrees and to recommend to the concerned Bchool Board in the manner prescribed by the Ordinances :-
(a) courses of studies and appointment of examiners for postgraduate courses, but excluding research degrees;
(b) appointment of supervisore of Y search; and
(c) measures for the improvement of the standard of postgraduate teaehing and research;

Provided that the above functions of a Board of Post-graduate Studies shall, during the period of three years immedjately after the commencement of this Act, be Performed by the Department.
(4) The constitution and furctions of a Board of Under-graduste Studies and the term of office of its members shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.

19 (1) The Finance Committee shall consist of the following

(5). L'he Finance Committee shall meet at least twice every year to examine the aecounts and to scrutiniee proposals for expenditute.
(6) The annual accounts and the financial estimates of the University prepared by the Fhnance Officer sball be laid before the Finance Committee for consideration and commenta and therealter submitted to the Executive Council for approval.
(7) The Finunoe Committee shall recommend limits for the total rearring expenditure and the total non-recurring expenciture for the year, based on the income and resources of the University (which, in the case of productive worke, may include the priceeds of logns ).
20. (I) There shall be Selection Committees for making recommendations to the Executive Council for appointment to the
posts of Professor, Reader, Lecturer, Librarian and Principals of Colleges and Institutions maintained by the University.
(2) The Selection Committee for appointment to the posto specified in column 1 of the Table below shall consist of the ViceChancellor, a Pro-Vice-Chancellor appointed by the Executive Council a nominee of the Visitor and the persons specified in the corresponding entry in column 2 of the said Table.

(ii) One Professor to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor.
(iii) Two persons not in the service of the University, nominated by the Executive Counoil, out of a panel of names recommended by the Academic Coancil for their special knowledge of or interest in the subject with which the Reader or Lecturer will be conerned.

Note 1.-Where the appointment is being made for an inter-dieciplinary project, the Head of the project shall be deemed to be the Head of the Department concerned.

Note 2 -The Professor to be nominated shall te a Professor concerned with the speciality for which the selection is being made and that the ViceChancellor shall consult the Head of the Department and the Dean of School before nominating the Professor.
(3) The Viee-Chancellor, or in his absence, the seniormost Pro-Vice-Chancellor; shall preside at the meetings of a Selection Committee.
(4) The meetings of a Selection Committee shail be convened by the Vice-Chancellor or in his absence, by the senior-most Pro-Vice-Chancellor.
(5) The procedure to be followed by a Selection Oommittee. in making recommendations shall be laid down in the Ordinances
(6) If the Executive Council is unable to acoept the recomin endations made by a Selection Committee, it oball record its reasons and submit the case to the Visitor for final orders
(7) Appointioents to temporary posts shall be made in the manner indicated below :-
(i) If the temporary vacancy is for a duration longer then one academic session, it shall be filled on the advice of the Deleotion Committee in accordance with the procedure indidated in the foregoing clanses :

Provided that if the Vice-Clancellor is satiofied that in the interests of work it is necessary to fill the vacancy, the appointment may be made on a purely temporary basis by a local Selection Committee referred to in sub-olause (ii) for a period not. exceeding six months.
(ii) If the temporary vacancy is for a period less than a year, an appointment to such vacancy shall be made on the recummendation of a local Selection Committee consisting of the Dean of the Sohool concerned, the Head of the Department and a nominee of the Vice-Chancellor:

Provided that if the same person holde the offices of the Dean and the Head of the Department, the Seleotion Committee may contain two nominees of the Vice-Chancellor :

Provided further that in case of sudden casual vecancies of teacbing posts caused by death or any other reason, the Dean may, in consultation with the Head of the Department concerned, make a temporary appointment for a month and report to the Vioe-Cbancellor and the Registrar about such appointment:
(isi) No teacher appointed temporarily shall, if he ie not reoommended by a reguler Selection Committee for appointment under these Statutes, be continued in service on such temporary employment, unless he is subsequently selected by a local' Selection Committee or a regular Selection Committee, for a temporary or permanent appointment, as the case may be:
21. (1) Notwithatanding anything contained in Btatute 20 , the Fixecutive Council may invite a person of high aosdemic distinotion and professional attainaments to accept a post of Professor or Reader or any other acade mic post in tke: Univel sify; as the

Special mode of appointmont. case may be, an such terms and conditions as it deems fft, and on the person agreeing to do so, appoint him to the post.
(2) The Executive Council may appoint a teacher or any other academic staff, working in any other University or organisation for undertaking a joint project in accordance - Nith the manner laid down in the Ordinances.

Appoiztment for fixed tenure:

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22. The Executive Council may, appoint a pason selected in accordance with the procedure laid down in Statate 20 for a fixed teoure on such terms:and ennditions as it deems fit.
23. (1) The qualifications of recognised teachers shall be such as may be prescribed by the Ordinances.
(2) All applications for the recognition of tachers shall be made in such manner as may be laid down in the Crdinances.
(3) No teacher shall be recognised as a teacher except on the recommendation of a Selection Committee cosstituted for the purpose in the manner laid ddwn in the Ordinancer.
(4) The period of recognition of a teacher shall be determined by Ordinances made in that behalf.
(5) The Academic Council may, by a special resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting, withdraw recognition from a teacher ;

Provided that no such resolution shall be passed until a notioe in writing has been given to the person concerned calling upon him to show cause, within such time as may be speoified in the notice, why such resolution should not be passed and until his objections, if any and any evidence he may produce in support of them, have been considered by the Academic Council.
(6) Any person aggrieved by an order of withdrawal under clause (5) may, within three months from the date of communication to him of such order, appeal to the Executive Council which may pass such orders thereon as! it thinks fit.
24. Any suthority of the University may appoint as many standing or special committees as it may deern fit, and may appoint to such committees persons who are not members of such authority. Any such committee may deal with any subject delegated to it subject to subsequent confirmation by the anthority appointing it.

25: (1) All the teachers of the University shall, in the sibsence of auy agreement to the contrary, be governed by the terms and conditions of service as spacified in these Statues, the Ordinances snd the Regalations,
(2) Eivery teacher of the University shall be sppinted on a written contract, the form of which shall be prescribed by the Ordinances A copy of the contract sball be deposited with the Registrar.
26. (1) Whenever, in accordance with these Statutes, any person is to hold an office or be a member of an authority of the University by rotation according to seniority, such seniority shall be determind adcording to the leigth of continuous service of such person in bis grade, and, in accordance with such other principles as the Executive Conncil may, from time to time prescribe.
(2) It sball be the duty of the Regiatrar to prepare and máintain, in respect of each class of persons to whom the provitions of these Statutes apply; a complete and up-to-dase seniority list in accordance with the provisions of clause (I).
(3) If two or more persons have equal leagtb of contipuous service in a particular grade or the ielative seniority of any person or persons is otherwise in doubt, the Registrar may, cn his own motion and shall, at the request of any such person, submit the matter to the Cixeoutive Conncil whoss decision thereon shall be final.
27. (1) Where there is an allegation of misconduct against a teacher, or a member of the academic staff, the Viee-Chancellor may, if he thinks fit, by order in writing, place the teacher under suspension and shall forthwith report to the Execative Council the circumstances in which the order was made.

Provided that the Executive Council may, if it is of the opinion, that the circumstances of the case do not warrant the suspension of the teacher or a member of the academie staff, revole, buch order.
(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in the terme of his contract of service or of his appointment, the Executive Council shall be entitled to remove a teacher or a member of the academic staft on the ground of misconduct.
(3) Save as aforessid, the Executive Counbil shall not be entitled to remove a teacher or a nember of the ecsdemic stafi except for good cause and after giving three months' notice in writing or on payment of three months salary in lieu of notice.
(4) No teacber or a member of the academic staff shall bo removed nnder clause (2) or under claine (3) until he bas been given a reasonsble opportunity of showing cause against the action proposed to be taken in regard to him.
(5) The removal of a teacher or a member of the academic tbeff shelh require a two- thirde mojoxity of the mombers of the Exacutive ©onneil present and voting.
(6) The removal of a teacher of memper; of the sademic Stafit shell tade effect from the date on whigh, the prder of removal is mpde ;

Provided that where teacher or a"member' of the academic staff is ander suspension at the time of bis removil, the removal
all take effect from the date on which be was placed under uspension:
(7) Notwithatanding anything contained in trese Atatutef a teacher or a member of the sademio staff may resign by giving three months' notice in writing to the Exeentive Council or on payment of three month s' sakiry in lieu thereof.
29. (1) Notwithstanding anything captained in the terms of his contrinat of earviee or of his appoiztment, an employee, other than a teaober or a member of the acedemio stoff, may be removed by the authority which is competent to appeint the employee-
(a) if he is of unsound mind or is a deaf-mute or suffers from contegipus leprosy;
(b) it he is an undischarged ingolwent;
(o) if ha bee been convicted by ocquat of isw of; any offence
 prisonment for not less than six monthe;

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(d) if he is otherwise guilty of misconduct;

Provided that no employee shall be removed from his office unless a resolution to that effect is passed by the Executive Council by a majority of two-thirds of its members present and voting.
(2) No employee shall be removed under clause (1) until he has been given a reasonable opportunity of showing cause against th, action proposed to be taken in regard to him.
(3) Where the removal of such employee is for a reason other than that specified in sub-clavee (c) or sub-clause ( $d$ ) of clause (l). he shall be given three months' notice in writing or paid three months' salary in lieu of such notice.
(4) Notwithstanding anything contsined in these Statutes, an employee, not being a teacher or a member of the academic staff, shall be entitled to resign, --
(i) if he is a permanent employee, only after giving three months' notice in writing to the appointing authority or paying to the Uaiversity three months' salary in lieu thereof;
(ii) if he is not a permanent employee, only after giving one month's botice in writing to the appointing authority or paying to the University one month's eslary in lieu thereof;

Provided that such resignation shall take effect from the date on which the resignation is accepted by the appointing authority.
29. (1) The Executive Council may, on the recommendation of the Academic Gouncil and by a resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members presents and voting, make proposals to the Visitor for the conferment of honorary degrees;

Provided that in case of emergency, the Executive Council may, on its own, make such proposals.
(2) The Executive Council may, by a resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting, withdraw, with the previous sanction of the Visitor, any honorary degree conferred by the University.

Withdrawal of degrees, etc.
30. The Executive Council may, by a special resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting, withdraw any degree or academic distinction conferred on, or any certificate or diploma granted to, any person by the University for good and sufficient cause;

Provided that no such resolution shall be passed until a notice in writing has been given to that person calling upon him to show cause within such time as may be specified in the notice why such a resolution should not be passed and until bis objections, if any, and any evidence he may produce in support of them, have been considered by the Executive Council.
31. (1) All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action in relation to students of the University shall vest in the Vice-Chancellor.
(2) The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or any of his powers as he deems proper to a Proctor and to such other officers as he may specify in this behalf.
(3) Without projudice to the generality of his powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action, as may seem to him appropriate for the maintenance of discipline, the Vice-Chancellor may, in the exercise of bis powers, by order, direct that any student or students be expelled, or rusticated, for a specified period, or be not admitted to a course or courees of study in a College, Institution or Department of the University for astated period, or be punished with fine for an amount to be specfied in the order, or be debarred from taking an examination or examinations conducted by the University, College, Institution or a Department for one or more yesrs, or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which he or they have appeared be cancelled.
(4) The Principsils of Colleges, Institutions, Heads of Special Centres, Deans of Schools of Studies and Heade of teaching Departments in the University shall have the anthority to exercise all such disciplinary powers ovar the studentif in their rospective Colleges, Institutions, Special Centres, Schools and teaching Departments in the University as may be necessary fer the proper conduct of such Colleges, Institutions. Special Centres, Schools and teaching in the Departmente.
(5) Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor, the Principals and other persons specified in clause (4), detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be made by the University. The Principals of Colleges, Institutions, Heads of Special Centres, Deans of Schools of Studies and Heads of teaching Departments in the Oniversity may also make the supplementary rules as they deem necessary for the aforesaid purposes. Every student shall be supplied with a copy of the rules made by the University and a copy of the supplementary rules sha!l be supplied to the students ooncerned.
(6) At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration to the effect that he submits himself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vioe-Chancellor and other authorities of the University.
32. All prowers relating to discipline and disciplinary action in relation to students of a College or an Institution, not maintained by the University, shall vest in the Principal of the College or Institution, as the case may be, in accordance with the procedure prescribed by the Ordinances.
33. (1) Colleges and other Institutions situated within the jurisdiction of the University may be admitted to such privileges of the University as the Executive Council may decide on the following conditions, namely :-
(i) Every such College or Institution shall have a regularly constituted Governing Bndy, consisting of not more then fifteen persons approved by the Executive Council and including, among others, two teachers of the University to be nominated by the

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Executive Council and three representatives of teaching staff of whom the Principal of the College or Institution shall be one. The procedure for appointment of members of the Governing Body and other matters aflecting the management of a College or an Institution shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.

Provided that the said condition shall not apply in the case of Colleges and Institutions maintained by Government which shall, however, have an Advisory Committee consisting of not more than fifteen persons which shall consist of, among others, three teachers including the Principal of the College or Institution, and two teachers of the University nominated by the Executive Council.
(ii) Every such Collage on Institution shall satisfy the Executive Council on the following matters, namely :-
(a) the suitability and adequacy of its accommodation and equipment for teaching.
(b) the qualifications and adequacy of its teaching stafi and the conditions of their service;
(c) the arrangements for the residence, welfare, discipline and supervision of students;
d) the adequacy of financial provision made for the continued maintenance of the College or Institution ; and
(c) such other matters ss are essential for the maintcnazce of the standarda of University education.
(iii) No College or Institution shall be admitted to sny privileges of the University except on the recommendation of the Academic Conpoil made after considering the report of a Committee of Inspection appointed for the purpose by the Aeademic Council.
(iv) Colleges and lnstitutions desirous of admission to any privileges of the University shall be required to intimate their intention to do so in writing so as to reach the Registrar not later than the 15th August, preceding the year from which permission applied for is to heve effeet.
(v) A College or an Institution shall not, withot the previous permission of the Exxecutive Council and the Academic Council, anspend instruction in any sobject or course of study which it is authorised to teach and tesches.
(2) Appointmens to the teaching staff and Principsis of Colleges or Institutions admitted to the privileges of the University shall be made in the mananer prescribed by the Ordinances.

Provided that nothing in this olause shall apply to Colleges and Institutions maintained by Covernment.
(3) The service conditions of the administrative and other nonnacademic 偱aff of every Colltge or Institution referred to in clause (2) shall be such as mey be laid down in the Ordinances.

Provided that nothing in this olause shall apply to Colleges and Institations main'ained by Government.
(4) Every College or Institution admitted to the privileges of the University shall be inspected at least once in every tiwo academic years by a Committee appointed by the Academic Council, and the report of that Committee shall be submitted to the Academic Council, which sha!l forward the same to the Executive Council with such recommendations as it may deem fit to make. The Executive Council, after considering the report and the recommendations, if any, of the Academic Council, shall forward a copy of the report to the Governing Body of the College or Institution with such remarks, if any, as it may deem fit, for suitable action.
(5) The Executive Council may, after consulting the Academic Council, withdraw any privileges granted to a College or Institution, at any time it considers that the College or Institution does not satisfy any of the conditions on the fulfilment of which the College or Institution was admitted to such privileges :

Provided that before any privileges are so withdrawn, the Governing. Body of the College or Institution concerned shall be given an oppontanity to represent to the Executive Council why suob action should not be taken.
( ${ }^{\prime}$ ) Snbject to the conditions get forth in clause (1), the Ordinances may prescribe-
(i) such other conditions as mesy be considered necesgary;
(is) the procedure for the admission of Colleges and Ingtitutions to the privileges of the University aid for the withidrawal of those privileges.
34. Convocations of the University for the conferring of degrees or for other purposes shall be held ios sueh manner as may be prescribed by the Ordinances.
35. Wheve no provision ie roade for a President of Chairman to preside over a meeting of any authoxity of the Dniversity or any Coramittee of euch authority or when the President or Chairman so provided for is absent, the memenere prosent sball elect one from among themselves to preside at such meeting.
36. Any member, other then an ex-0书ice member of the Court, the Fxecutive Council the Accidemie Council on any other authority of the University or any Committee of such authonity may resign by letter addressed to the Regiatrar and the resignation shall take effect as soon as suoh letter is received by the Registrar.
37. (1) A person sball be disqualifled for being choses as, and for being, a member of any of the authorities of the University -
(a) if he is of unsoand mind or is a deaf-imute or suffers frcm oontagious leproay;
(b) if he is an undischaraed insolvent;
(c). if he has bean covicted by a court of law of an offence involving maral turpitude and sentenced in respect thereof to imprisonment for not leas than six montha.
(2) If any question arises as to whether a person is or had been subjectea to afy of the disqualifications mentioned in clause (1), the queation ahall be referred for the decision uf the Visitor and hic dacision ghall be fiag apd no spit or other proceeding shall lie in any civil court ag tinst such deciaion.

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Disqualifications

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Alumni Associa. tion.
38. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Statutes, no person who is not ordinarily resident in India shall be eligible to be an officer of the University or a member of asy authority of the University.
39. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Statutes, a person who holds any post in the University or is a member of any authority or body of the University in his capacity as a member of a narticular authority ، $r$ body or as the bolder of a partioular appointment suall hold such office or membership only for so long as he continues to be a membar of that partioular authority or body or the holdar of that particular appointment, as the case may be.
40. (1) There sball be an Alumni Association for the University,
(2) The subscription for nembership of the Alumni Association shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.
(3) ' No member of the Alumni Association sball be entitled to vote or stand for election unless he has been a member of the Association for at least one year prior to the date of the election and is a graduate of the University of at least five years' standing:

Provided that the condition relating to the completion of one year's membership shall not apply in the case of the firet election.
41. (1) The first Ordinanoes made under sub-seciion (2) of sostion 26 may be amended, repealed or added to at any time by the Executive Council in the manner specified below.
(2) No Ordinance in respect of the matters enumerated in section 26, ofher than those enumerated in clavse ( $n$ ) of sub-section (1) thereof, shall bs made by the Executive Council unlers a draft of such Ordinance has been proposed by the Aoademic Council.
(3) The Executive Council shall not heve power to amend any draft of any Ordinance proposed by the Academic Conncil under clause (2', bat may reject the proposal or return the draft to the Academic Council for re-consideration, either in whole or in part, togetber with any amendment which the Executive Conncil may suggest.
(4) Where the Executive Council has rejected or returned the draft of an Ordinance proposed by the Academic Council, the Academic Council may consider the question afresh and in case the original draft is re-affirmed by majority of not less than twothirds of the members present and voting and more than half the total number of members of the Academic Council, the draft may be sent back to the Executive Conncil which shall eitber adopt it or refer it to the Visitor whose decision sball be final.
(5) Every Ordinsnoe made by the Executive Council shall come into effect immediately.
(6) Every Ordinance made by the Executive Council shall be submitted to the Visitor within two weaks from the date of its adoption. The Vistor shall bave the power to direct the University within four weeks of the receipt of the O dinance to susvend the operation of any such Ordinance and he alifil, as soon as possible, inform the Executive Council about his objection to the proposed Ordinance. 'The Visitor may, after receiving the
comments of the Univeraity, either withdraw the order suspending the Ordinance or disallow the Ordthance, and his deciaion shall be final.
42. (1) The aqthorities of tha University may make Regulations consistent with thia Act, and these Btatutes and the Ordinancer :-
(e) laying down the procedure to be observed at their meetinge and the number of members required to form a quornm;
(b) Providing for all matters which are required by this Act, these Statates or the Ordinances to be preseribed by Regulations;
(c) providing for all other matters solely concerning such sutho rities or committees appointed by them and not provided for by this Act, these Btatutes or the Ordinances.
(2) Every anthority of the University shall make Regulations providing for the giving of notice to the members of auch anthority of the dates of mastings and of the business to be considered at meetiags and for the keeping of a record of the proceedings of meetingl.
(8) The Execative Council may driect the amendment in such manner as is may speoify, of any Regulstion made under this Statute or the annulment of any such Regulation.
43. Subject to the provieions of this Act and the se Statates, any officer or authority of the University may delegate his or its poweza to any other

Bogula. tiona. officer or anthority or person under his or its respective control and subject to the condition that oversll responsibility for the exercise of the powers eo delegated shall contince to vest in the officer or anthority delegasing auch powers.

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
